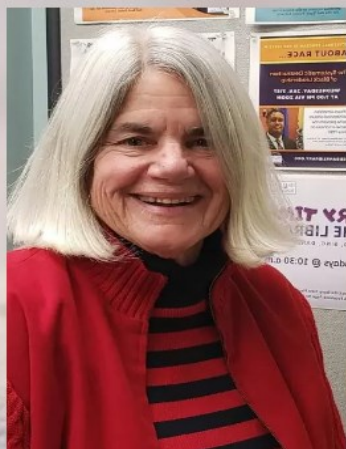
Employee Spotlight
