

PROCLAMATION

BOROUGH OF RED BANK

“NATIONAL BLACK BUSINESS AND BLACK PHILANTHROPY MONTH”

WHEREAS: John William Templeton, a historian, and Frederick E. Jordan, Sr., a civilian engineer, founded Black Business Month in 2004 in an effort to drive policy agenda affecting the 2.6 million Black-owned businesses across the nation to recognize them and highlight the economic impact in their respective communities, state, and nation; and

WHEREAS: Templeton and Jordan thought that highlighting Black entrepreneurs and encouraging people to support their businesses is key to reducing barriers for Black-owned businesses, and "could result in more than 40,000 additional jobs during the month and as many as 450,000 if the patterns are continued over the course of a year"; and

WHEREAS: The U.S. Minority Business Development Agency estimates the 2.6 million Black-owned businesses in the United States generates approximately \$150 billion each year; and

WHEREAS: Black business owners account for approximately 10 percent of U.S. businesses and about 30 percent of all minority-owned businesses, which amounts to 2.6 million African American owned businesses in the U.S. that generate approximately \$150 billion in annual receipts; and

WHEREAS: The number of Black-owned businesses -and those owned by women -continue to grow, as the number of firms owned by Black women grew 164% from 2007 to 2018, nearly three times the average rate; and

WHEREAS: Supporting and promoting Black-owned businesses helps to close the racial wealth gap, and encourages the flourishing of the local community and culture; and


WHEREAS: Red Bank is home to a variety of Black-owned businesses that provide family-supporting jobs and careers to residents, and these businesses are a vital and proud component of our diverse community.
